Preparing for life beyond Year 11

We're going to look at some of the options you have when you leave Blessed Trinity. Legally, you must be in some education or training for two years, so it's important that you choose the right thing – we want you to really enjoy your course or apprenticeship!

Usually in Year 11, we go through the following steps:

IAG Interviews	These individual interviews will still happen in the autumn term. They are an opportunity to have individual support, advice and guidance around choosing your post-16 route. These will happen with Mrs Hart. You can also request a careers interview here https://forms.office.com/e/igTj87tP4Q .
Mock Interviews	This event is planned to take place on Thursday 17 October 2024 – more information regarding this will follow.
Future Careers Fair	This is planned to take place on Wednesday 9 October 2024 . This is a planned event for all schools across Burnley and we will visit the Fair on this date.
Open Events	Please see the table within this booklet for all planned events.
Application Sessions	You will be supported to make applications for Colleges, Sixth Forms and training providers.
CV Workshops	You will be supported to make sure your CV is as good as it can be before you have to send it as part of an application for an apprenticeship.
Provider Drop-Ins	Colleges and Training Providers will be in school at break and lunchtime to discuss your options. Dates and times to follow.

What Post-16 Options are available?

Providers: You have a choice of three main types of post-16 provider:

- **Sixth Forms** only offer A Levels. They are often more 'school-like', smaller and provide more structure.
- **Colleges** can offer A Levels, T Levels, Vocational/Technical courses and Apprenticeships but all are different. It is important to check that the place you want to go offers the course you want! They tend to be larger, but offer you more independence.
- **Training Providers** only offer Apprenticeships.

Courses: There are four main types of course you can choose from after Year 11. You will only choose one, though it is always sensible to think about your 'back-up' option too.

- A Levels
- T Levels
- Vocational / Technical
- Apprenticeship

A Levels

- Can be studied in either sixth form or college.
- You choose 3-4 subjects, which tend to be more 'traditional'.
- They are mainly theory-based, have less practical work and are assessed by exam at the end of the second year.
- They are a good way to keep studying more than one subject.
- You have to be prepared to work hard independently to keep up with the workload.
- A Level subjects include:

T Levels are new!

- There is a limited subject range.
- You choose 1 main subject, but can often specialise in year 2.
- 80% time in college, 20% on work placement.
- They are assessed by exam, coursework and practical.
- They have been developed with employers to help you be productive in the workplace and learn relevant skills.

Vocational/ Technical

- You choose 1 subject, which leads into a work area.
- They are assessed mainly by ongoing coursework, with some exams and some practical work.
- They are done in a college.
- There is often an element of work placement to help you put your skills into practice.

Apprenticeship

- You choose 1 subject.
- You go to work – **a real job** – for 80% of your time. Off the job training is 20%. This often (but not always) means 4 days in work, 1 day in college.
- You are paid! But you don't get school holidays
- They are done with an employer in conjunction with a college or training provider.
- The application process is more difficult as you will also have interviews with employers.
- They are a brilliant option if you are sure about the industry you want to work in - they are not a good option if you aren't certain!

Remember: things may be difficult for employers this year so there may not be as many vacancies as normal.

How do you progress?

- You can progress to university after any Level 3 course. Different universities have different entry requirements, so it's important to check details with ucas.com (*search undergraduate courses*)
- You can progress to Higher or Degree Apprenticeships after any Level 3 course. On a degree apprenticeship, your employer pays your university tuition fees!
- You can go directly into work when you have completed 2 years of study.
- If you start on a lower level of course, you can keep working up until you complete Level 3.
- It would be a good idea to continue to complete Level 3 as this will help you in a competitive employment market.

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Your GCSE grades may affect which courses you can apply for. We want you to continue to work as hard as you can so that you get the best possible grades you can. It basically means you can start at a higher level before you progress into your adult life. Remember, though, there are different levels of many courses, so there is an option to suit every one.

Autumn Term 2024

	Tick
If you haven't visit XELLO and find out about the careers that interest you! Research and check all the entry requirements.	
Pick up a prospectus from school and read through your course options.	
Attend all the open events at the colleges that interest you.	
Consider signing up for one of the Year 11 Taster Programmes offered at local colleges	
Attend your careers guidance interview in school to look at your options and gain further advice and help about the future. You can prepare for this interview by registering with XELLO and answering all the questions. You can also complete the Action Plan in this booklet prior to your interview – make a note of any questions that you would like to ask.	
If you're thinking about university after college then research the courses and check the entry requirements. www.ucas.com	
If you are considering an apprenticeship then visit www.apprenticeships.org.uk and register to apply for vacancies.	
Check application deadlines – there may be some this term!	
If you still don't have a firm career idea then think about how you can keep your future options open	
Continue to work on your CV and Personal Statement. You started this during the summer term of Year 10.	
If you are ready start to complete your college applications online, ask for support from Mrs Hart if you need it	

Spring Term 2025

Have a backup plan - it's okay to apply for more than one college! If you are considering an apprenticeship – always apply for full time college as a backup as well	
Prepare for any interviews that you might have arranged	
If you are still unsure – don't panic! Speak to Mrs Hart your Careers Adviser in school	
If you are considering an apprenticeship then this term is key for applications – check closing dates for some organisations and start to apply for others	

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Summer Term 2025

If you are still unsure about your plans speak to Mrs Hart	
Make sure you confirm your acceptance of any places that are offered to you	
Think about work experience and voluntary work during the summer holidays
