Science and Digital trips are rewarding




At Blessed Trinity, we know the importance of trips out of school to hear from experts in their fields as pupils plan for their future careers.

40 Year 10 pupils visited Bridgewater Hall in Manchester to watch Science Live!

They had the chance to hear from world-famous scientists who are experts in their field, including Professor Robert Winston and Professor Jim Al-Khalili.

They also received tips on examination success in GCSE Sciences and they were shown how science offers solutions to many of the world's problems.

Pupils also had the chance to ask questions to the scientists and left with a booklet about working as a scientist.



Dawud said: "It was really interesting. It showed me aspects of science which I hadn't really considered before. I want to go into science as a career so it was helpful."

Year 11 sessions are paying off



Our current Year 11 pupils say their teachers are doing everything they can to ensure they are equipped to achieve the grades they need to take their next step in life.

They completed their Mock GCSE exams before Christmas and, now they have their grades, they can work on the subjects they need to through extra revision sessions and intervention programmes.

Aimee said: "I received my Mock GCSE results and I was pleased to see I had done better than what I expected. "I got two grades higher in some subjects.

"I have been attending revision sessions and I have found them useful.

"I need Grade 7s and 8s to do Forensic Science at Burnley College so that's what I am aiming for." Connor said: "I did better than expected in some subjects but I need to work harder on my Maths and History. I go to after-school and intervention sessions for Maths in focused morning sessions, multiple times a week.

"I want to do an Apprenticeship and get a trade so I am working towards that."
Kai wants to be an electrician. "I go to extra sessions when I can. I didn't get the grade I wanted in English and so that's something I am working on."
Head of Year Miss Wilkinson said: "I'm proud of the amount of effort Year 11 are putting into their revision for their exams, I hope this is rewarded by achieving the results they deserve in the summer exams. Thank you to all the amazing teachers who are giving up their time to hold afterschool revision sessions with the pupils."

Junior is aiming high in darts

Year 11 darts player Junior admits teenage champion Luke Littler is 'amazing' - and he hopes he can follow in his footsteps.

Junior had been playing darts for three years and is ranked in the top 40 in England at Under 17 level. He plays at Blackburn Youth Darts Academy.

"I am trying to get a tour card on the junior tour, it's called the UK Q-School. I went to Coventry a few weeks ago and it's the top 12 who get a card.

"I played in four events and played the World No 1 Under 17, who is Belgian, but lost 4-1 although it was a good experience. I just missed out on the tour card.

"I have another chance in a couple of week in Coventry on the Foundation Tour. It's 20 events over five months and I have to finish in the top four. I will give it my best shot."
